Snorkeling is possible directly off the beach; while the resort doesn't have a house reef, a natural reef (Bight Reef) is about a 10-minute walk down the beach and offers great snorkeling from shore. Additionally, Beaches includes free snorkel trips by boat (and even free SCUBA diving for certified divers) as part of the all-inclusive package. You can go on daily boat excursions to nearby coral reefs at no extra cost, which is a huge perk for snorkelers. Water sports like paddleboarding, kayaking, sailing, and windsurfing are also free.
- Safety and off-site access: Turks & Caicos is very safe, and Grace Bay is a secure, upscale area. Cons:

5. Moon Palace Jamaica (Ocho Rios, Jamaica)

Moon Palace Jamaica in Ocho Rios offers a mix of **modern all-inclusive luxury and a convenient town-adjacent location**.
